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# Land Acknowledgement

It is acknowledged that the lands and communities discussed in this report are situated on the Traditional Territory of the Anishinabek Nation:

The People of the Three Fires known as Ojibwe, Odawa, and Pottawatomie Nations. The Chippewas of Saugeen and the Chippewas of Neyaashiinigmiing (Nawash), now known as the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, are the traditional keepers of this land and water. It is also recognized that the ancestors of the Historic Saugeen Métis and Georgian Bay Métis communities shared this land and these waters.

### Notes on Data

This report includes information for the Municipality of South Bruce and compares it to Bruce County and the Province of Ontario. In some cases, other communities within Bruce County are used for further comparisons. Data from previous community studies was included were Census 2021 estimates were not available during the writing of this report. The following data sources were used in developing this community profile:

- Statistics Canada, Canadian Business Counts, December 2021
- Manifold Data Mining, 2020 (Data collected for previous community studies)
- Metroeconomics (Data collected for previous community studies)
- Statistics Canada, Census Profile, 2021, and 2016
- Lightcast (formerly EMSI Economic Modeling), 2022

#### Other Notes:

- The December 2021 Canadian Business Counts were used to determine the total number of registered businesses in South Bruce. Statistics Canada's Canadian Business Counts Data provides a record of business establishments by industry and size. This data is collected from the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). The business data collected for South Bruce included all local businesses that met at least one of the three following criteria: Have an employee workforce for which they submit payroll remittances to CRA, or have a minimum of \$30,000 in annual sales revenue, or are incorporated under a federal or provincial act and have filed a federal corporate income tax form within the past three years.
- The 2021 Census of Population is the latest and most widely available data product offered by Statistics Canada.

#### **Definitions**

As part of this Community Profile, a Location Quotient (LQ) Analysis was completed to determine the concentration of industries (businesses) in South Bruce relative to the Province. It reveals what makes a region unique. The LQ's Classifications are as follows:





### Introduction

#### **About South Bruce**

#### **History**

South Bruce was created in 1999 as part of province-wide and county-wide municipal restructuring. In 1998, the Township of Culross and the Village of Teeswater amalgamated to form the Township of Teeswater-Culross. Similarly, the Village of Mildmay joined with the Township of Carrick to form the Township of Mildmay-Carrick. The following year, both Mildmay-Carrick and Teeswater-Culross amalgamated again to form South Bruce, choosing Teeswater as the seat of the municipality.<sup>1</sup>

#### Location

South Bruce is situated in the southeast corner of Bruce County and is located inland from Lake Huron. The community is 90 km from Owen Sound, the Grey-Bruce region's largest urban centre.<sup>2</sup>

#### **Land Sizes and Uses**

South Bruce covers a land area of 486.86 square kilometres<sup>3</sup>. It is comprised of a large rural area interspersed with smaller settlement areas. The three main population centres in South Bruce are Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater. South Bruce is predominantly an agricultural community<sup>4</sup>.




Figure 1: Municipality of South Bruce, Land Uses

#### **Vision and Strategic Plan**

South Bruce's Corporate Strategic Plan defines the vision of success, based on the needs, values, and aspirations of the community. The mission of the Municipality of South Bruce is to provide appropriate and efficient services and programs to the residents that will enhance the quality of life, provide a safe and desirable environment in which to work and raise their families. In terms of the Municipality's vision, the Municipality see itself as a "growing, dynamic, agriculturally rooted community that provides accessible and affordable amenities for residents and businesses, creating an environment supportive of growth, vibrant downtowns that foster small business, and a unique, year-round destination experience" <sup>5</sup>.

#### Official Plan

The Council of the Municipality of South Bruce will attempt to achieve the following goals through the implementation of its Official Plan, last updated in 2019.<sup>6</sup>

- 1. To enhance the function of Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater as local service centres for the surrounding agricultural community and as progressive, attractive communities in which to live and work.
- 2. To ensure that a variety of residential housing types, densities and tenure arrangements are provided in order to accommodate housing opportunities for all residents.
- 3. To maintain the downtowns as the major focus of commercial activity in Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater and to promote an intensification of the downtowns through commercial, residential, recreational, and institutional development.
- 4. To ensure that new development in Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater is consistent with the level of services that can be provided in the community and in a manner that will minimize costs to the taxpayer.
- 5. To ensure that development within Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater contributes to the creation of a small-town rural environment.
- 6. To encourage the preservation and restoration of historic or older buildings.
- 7. To ensure that new development will respect the natural environment and to discourage incompatible development within environmentally sensitive areas of Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater.
- 8. To encourage new industry within Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater and to encourage its location in areas where appropriate levels of servicing are available and where the potential impacts on the adjacent land uses will be minimized.
- 9. To encourage new recreational facilities, such as multi-use trails and parks, in Formosa, Mildmay and Teeswater, and throughout the Municipality of South Bruce.

#### Regional Context

#### **Bruce County**

Bruce County is an upper tier municipality comprised of eight lower tier municipalities. The County is responsible for a unique and diverse set of functions that ranges from building bridges, to delivering social programs, long term care, and paramedic services to providing arts and cultural experiences through high caliber Museum, Library, and Tourism experiences<sup>7</sup>. Bruce County includes the communities of Arran-Elderslie, Brockton, Huron-Kinloss, Kincardine, Northern Bruce Peninsula, and South Bruce Peninsula, Saugeen Shores, and South Bruce. Many of these municipalities, are the result of amalgamations involving rural townships and villages.

The following is an introduction to each of the other communities, with respect to their location within Bruce County<sup>8</sup>, Census 2021 population are presented for each community

- Municipality of Arran-Elderslie, which has a population of 6,913 people (2021), is located in southern Bruce County, near the eastern boundary of Grey and Bruce Counties. The community has a strong agricultural base with high quality farmland. The municipality is located within 30 minutes of Owen Sound, the Grey- Bruce region's largest centre. Arran-Elderslie includes communities such as Tara, Paisley, and Chesley.
- Municipality of Brockton, which has a population of 9,784 people (2021), is located in southeastern Bruce County in an area with strong agricultural roots and high-quality farmland. Brockton was form as a new amalgamated community in 1999 by combining aspects of the names of former townships of Brant and Greenock, as well as the Town of Walkerton. The Town of Walkerton is the county seat of Bruce County and is located within Brockton. The Municipality is located within one hour of Owen Sound, the Grey-Bruce region's largest regional centre.
- Township of Huron-Kinloss, which has a population of 7,723 people (2021), is located on the eastern shore of Lake Huron south of Kincardine. The Township boundary extends as far as Whitechurch Road from the lake where it meets with a boundary extending south from Highway 9. The largest communities in the township are Ripley, Point Clark, and Lucknow.
- Municipality of Kincardine, which has a population of 12,268 people (2021), is located on Lake Huron and includes many communities including Kincardine, Tiverton, Inverhuron, and Underwood. Kincardine is accessible from Highway 21 which extends to the north and south of the community, as well as Highway 9 which extends to the southeast. The municipality is home to the Inverhuron Provincial Park and has a strong seasonal recreation sector focused on beaches and other recreation opportunities. The municipality is also home to Bruce Power, a nuclear electricity generator which constitutes a major employer for the region.
- Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula, which has a population of 4,404 people (2021), includes the communities of Tobermory, Lion's Head and Hope Bay. Highway 6 extends through the Municipality from north to south, and a ferry service provides access north beyond the peninsula to Manitoulin Island. The Municipality has a strong recreation sector based in Tobermory due to Bruce Peninsula National Park and Fathom Five National Marine Park, as well as the Chi-Cheemaun car ferry. Tobermory, located at the northern extent of the municipality, is located 110 km from Owen Sound.
- Town of Saugeen Shores, which has a population of 15,908 people (2021), the Town of Saugeen Shores formed through the amalgamation of Port Elgin, Southampton, and the surrounding area along the Saugeen River. The Town is located along Highway 21, a northsouth corridor that provides access to communities such as Kincardine and Goderich to the south.
- Town of South Bruce Peninsula, which has a population of 9,137 people (2021), the Municipality of South Bruce Peninsula is located in the southern portion of Bruce Peninsula from Hope Bay to Allenford. The largest communities in the municipality are Sauble Beach, Wiarton, and Hepworth. Highway 6 is the main transportation corridor through central and eastern portions of the municipality.
- First Nations Reservations, Bruce County includes several First Nations communities. They include Chief's Point 28 (population 15), Saugeen 29 (population 784), Neyaashiinigmiing 27

(population 580), and the Hunting Grounds of Cape Croker Hunting Ground 60B, and Saugeen Hunting Grounds 60A.

### Demographic Characteristics

#### Demographic Profile

#### **Population Growth**

In 2021, the Municipality of South Bruce had an estimated population of 6,254 people<sup>9</sup>. This represents a growth in population of approximately 8% (an additional 453 people), compared to 2016, and a 7% growth compared to  $2011^{10}$ .

The population in South Bruce is projected to growth over the next 20 years. The Municipality's population is expected to reach 7,968 by 2036, and 8,765 people by 2046; these represent a 27% growth, and 40% growth, respectively<sup>11</sup>.

In terms of gender, estimates show that between 2011 and 2021, approximately 51% of the municipality's population were males. Starting in 2031, shifts in population will increase the female population in the area, reaching a similar share of population between 2031 to 2041. By 2046, the female population in South Bruce is expected to represent 51% of the Municipality's population.

#### **Age of Population**

In 2021, the largest age group in South Bruce were children (0 to 14 years of age) – this group represents 19% of the Municipality's population, followed by late career and early retirement (55 to 64 years of age) at 15%.

The "working prime" groups together (25 to 54 years of age) were 35% of the population in 2021. Meanwhile, the percentage of people within the retirement age (65 years and over) represented 18% of South Bruce's population.

Projection estimates show that the population in South Bruce will see a significant growth in the elderly population group (75 years and over); +152% growth. The Municipality will also see important population growth in groups such as children, young and mid working prime; this suggests an increasing number of young families relocating to South Bruce.




Figure 6: Population Projections by Major Economic Age Group, South Bruce 2021-2046

#### **Indigenous Identity**

According to Statistics Canada, in 2021, approximately 2% of South Bruce's population identified as Indigenous (115 people). Most of these people (90 people), identified as Métis, and 20 people identified as First Nations. The share of Indigenous population in South Bruce is lower than those in Bruce County and Ontario.<sup>12</sup>




Figure 7: Indigenous Identity, 2011-2021

#### **Human and Linguistic Diversity**

As of 2020, the visible minority population in South Bruce reached 71 people (1% of the population). The municipality shows a lower proportion of visible minority compared to Bruce County at 3%, and the province at 29% of the population. The majority of the municipality's population is of European descent. The largest visible minority present within South Bruce was Korean (31) followed by South Asian (20) and Filipino (17).

Most of the people in South Bruce are fluent in English, and approximately 4% also speaks French (both official languages of Canada). Furthermore, 4% of the population in South Bruce knows a non-official language, most of these speak Dutch (85 people), German (65 people), Spanish (25 people), and Portuguese (20 people).

#### **Household Income**

The median household income in South Bruce was \$88,000 by 2020. This is 1% higher than the median household income in Bruce County, and 3% lower than in Ontario. Compared to 2016, median household grew by 23% in South Bruce; this was 1% more growth than the county and the province.

Compared to 2011, the median household total income has increased 31% in South Bruce, a similar growth rate to Bruce County, and 6% lower than Ontario at 37%.




Figure 10: Median Household Total Income, 2010-2020

#### **Dwelling**

As per the 2021 Census Data, South Bruce has approximately 2,280 occupied private dwellings. As shown in the figure below Error! Reference source not found., South Bruce's existing housing stock is predominately comprised of single-detached dwelling (i.e., low-density units) at 88%. The municipality has almost no high-rise buildings (greater than 5 storeys). It is understood that a wide variety of housing types is needed to support a younger cohort, newcomers, single households, and seniors.

#### **Educational Attainment**

Manifold Data Mining estimates South Bruce's skilled labour pool (people 15 years of age and over with a post-secondary certificate, diploma or degree) to be 2,161 people, representing 44% of the total population aged 15 and older. Compared to the 2016 Census, South Bruce's skilled labour grew by 7%, this is lower than the growth experienced by Bruce County at 11%.

Compared to 2011, the share of skilled labour force in South Bruce increased by 2%. During all periods, the share of skilled labour force in the Municipality has been lower than in Bruce County and the province.

In 2020, 26% of the municipality's population aged 15 years and over had no certificate, diploma or degree compared to the province at 18%. 30% of South Bruce's population had a secondary (high) school diploma or equivalency certificate, while 22% had college, CEGEP, or non-university diplomas. Only 10% of people in the municipality have a university certificate, diploma, or degree at a bachelor level or above, compared to 15% in the Bruce County, and 26% of people in the province.

The following figure shows the major fields of study for the Municipality's population aged 15 years and older with a postsecondary certificate, diploma, or degree. Similar to provincial trends, the majority of the municipality's population have an education related to architecture, engineering, and related technologies (602 people or 12%), followed by health and related fields (319 people or 6%) and business, management, and public administration (270 people or 5%).

# Labour Force and Employment

#### Labour Force in South Bruce

#### **Labour Force Trends**

According to the standard definition employed by Statistics Canada, the employed are persons having a job or business, whereas the unemployed are without work, are available for work, and are actively seeking work. Together the unemployed and the employed constitute the labour force. He tween 2011 and 2016, both South Bruce and Bruce County experienced a slight decline in the labour force, -0.6% and -1% respectively, while Ontario grew at 4%. More recently, between 2016 and 2020, the municipalities labour force grew by 7%, adding 237 people. During this time, South Bruce experienced lower labour force growth compared to Bruce County at 11% and the province at 12%.



According to the Bank of Canada, population ageing is the key factor behind the decline in Canada's participation rates.<sup>15</sup> Therefore, it is expected that as the population ages and replacement rates remain below the optimal rate,<sup>16</sup> participation rates will continue to drop. The following figure shows that participation rates in the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula have been fluctuated and remain lower than those in the Province and Canada since July 2020. The economic region of Stratford – Bruce Peninsula<sup>17</sup> has a population of around 317,232.<sup>18</sup>

When analyzing the participation rate month over month, a decline starts in March 2020 which coincides with the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. By December 2020, the participation rate in the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula was 63.9%, which was 1.8% lower than the participation rate recorded in December January 2020 and 2.2% lower than the participation rate recorded in March 2020. As per Statistics Canada, the participation rate in the economic region by September 2022 was 63.8%.

The unemployment rate trendline also provides evidence related to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic in Canada, Ontario, and the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula. By July 2020, the unemployment rate had reached 8.7%. However, unemployment rates dropped in the subsequent months. By December 2020, the Stratford-Bruce Peninsula was experiencing a lower unemployment rate of 5.9%, compared to Ontario at 8.6% and Canada at 8.1%. As per Statistics Canada, the economic region showed an unemployment rate of 2.7% by September 2022.




Figure 17: Unemployment rates, Stratford-Bruce Peninsula, Ontario, January 2019 – December 2020

#### **Labour Force by Industry**

Labour force by industry refers to individuals by place of residence. This means the labour force information for South Bruce includes residents working or looking for jobs, regardless the location of the employment (e.g., a South Bruce resident working in Brockton). Labour force should not be confused with employment (number of jobs in the community, regardless where the employee lives). For industry sectors with less than 10 jobs, information has been supressed due to privacy issues; this data has been labeled as "insf. Data".

In 2020, South Bruce accounted for a labour force of 3,494 people. The following figure shows the total number of individuals and the percentage of the labour force by industry in South Bruce and comparative rates in Ontario. South Bruce is centred in the following industry sectors:

Manufacturing, Health care and social assistance and Retail trade are also prominent sectors in the province.

As shown in the following figure, the labour force in South Bruce grew by 7.2% from 2016 to 2020, an increase of 234 people from 2016 to reach a labour force of 3,494; while some industries saw growth, A few sectors saw their labour force decline.

From 2011 to 2016 the industry that had the largest decline in labour force was Manufacturing (-90), while the industry that had the largest increase was Construction (+125). Manufacturing and construction both increased their labour force between 2016 and 2020.

Industries that showed the largest labour force growth between 2016 and 2020 included educational services (+32), manufacturing (+31), wholesale trade (+26), health care and social assistance (+25) and public administration (+25).

Industries that showed a decline in the labour force between 2016 and 2020 included accommodation and food services (-20) arts, entertainment, and recreation (-10), and other services (except public administration) (-9).

#### **Labour Force by Occupation**

As indicated in the following figure, the (resident) labour force by occupations shows that trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations is the largest occupational sector, accounting for 23% or 803 of total occupations. Sales and service occupations ranked second highest in South Bruce at 16% (560 occupations), followed by Management occupations at 16% (544 occupations).



#### **Employment in South Bruce**

#### **Employment Trends**

In 2016, the number of jobs in South Bruce reached 1,856 ( $\pm$ 21 jobs since 2011 – 1% growth). The following year saw a decrease of 248 jobs to 1,608 total, a 13% decrease. Since then, employment has remained stable and gained a small amount to 1,619 in 2022. Looking forward to 2028, Lightcast projects that employment in South Bruce will grow slightly to 1,664, a 3% increase.

Between 2011 and 2016, South Bruce experienced a slight increase in employment overall, with significant gains between 2011 to 2012 and small loses and gains in following years. Employment suffered a sharp decline of 13% between 2016 and 2022. Bruce County on the other hand

experience employment losses from 2011 to 2022, with a smaller relative decline from 2016 to 2022. Bruce County is expected to grow at a slightly faster rate than South Bruce between 2022 and 2028. The Province of Ontario has seen constant employment growth from 2011 and 2022 and is projected to continue its growth to 2028.




Figure 25: Employment Change (%), 2011-2016

#### **Employment by Industry**

In 2022, the largest industry sectors by employment in South Bruce were agricultural, forestry, fishing, and hunting (404 jobs - 25% of jobs), manufacturing (195 jobs - 12% of jobs), construction (194 jobs - 12% of jobs), and retail trade (161 jobs - 10% of jobs). Goods producing sectors make up 52% of the total employment in the municipality. These industries are often more export oriented than other industries and bring value back to the local economy.

A deeper analysis shows that the largest industry subsectors  $(4\text{-digit NAICS})^{19}$  in South Bruce are farms (392 jobs – 24% of employment), followed by services to buildings and dwellings (75 jobs – 5% of employment), grocery stores (65 jobs – 4% of employment), and residential building construction (59 jobs – 4% of jobs).

#### **Employment by Occupation**

In 2022, the trades, transport, and equipment operators and related occupations had the highest share of overall employment in South Bruce, and employed 370 people, representing 23% of jobs in the municipality. Management occupations (314 occupations), and sales and service occupations (311 occupations) rank second and third, respectively. This matches with the above employment by industry analysis, as the top occupations match the top industries.

#### Canadian Business Counts

#### **Businesses by Industry and Size**

As of December 2021, approximately 901 businesses were recorded in South Bruce. The figure below shows the total businesses in the Municipality, the majority of which were businesses without employees i.e., sole proprietorships with more than \$30,000 in sales: approximately 692 businesses fall under this category. 128 businesses employ between 1 to 4 employees, while 65 businesses employed between 5 to 19 employees. South Bruce is home to large business establishments, with approximately two businesses employing at least 100 employees.

The following sectors (as shown in the previous Figure) have the highest proportion of business establishments by industry by December 2021. These include business without employees and businesses with employees.

- Agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting 417 businesses (46% of total businesses)
- Real estate and rental and leasing 84 businesses (9% of total businesses)
- Construction 80 businesses (9% of total businesses)

Industry sectors with the highest number of businesses without employees by December 2021 slightly differ from the highest total business establishment proportions. However, the largest industries were similar to the overall total. The highest sole proprietorships in 2020 were in:

 Agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting – 356 businesses (51% of total businesses without employees)

- Real estate and rental and leasing 77 businesses (11% of total businesses without employees)
- Construction 34 businesses (6% of total businesses without employees)

The top industry sectors with employees by December 2021 were:

- Agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting 61 businesses (29% of total businesses with employees)
- Construction 46 businesses (22% of total businesses with employees)
- Other services (except public administration) 15 businesses (7% of total businesses with employees)

Business establishments in South Bruce are characterized by micro-businesses, with 61% of businesses with staff employing between 1-4 workers, and 31% of businesses are small businesses with between 5-19 employees. It is important to note the small number of medium-and large-size firms in the municipality's economy. Small firms are generally the major source of new products and ideas, while mid-size and large business are typically more export-oriented and generate higher operating surpluses. A healthy mix of small, medium, and large firms ensures that a community can capitalize on innovation and entrepreneurship opportunities and at the same time attract and grow investment. Micro and small businesses are also more susceptible to fluctuations in the economy.

#### **Business Concentrations**

As part of this Community Profile, a Location Quotient (LQ) Analysis was completed to determine the concentration of industries (businesses) in South Bruce relative to the Province. It reveals what makes a region unique. The LQ's Classifications are as follows:



South Bruce's industries were benchmarked against the province at the 2-digit industry sub-sector levels to determine the business concentration. Key insights are described below:

- South Bruce County has a high concentration of businesses in the agriculture sector, the
  utilities sector, mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction, and the public administration
  sector.
- The agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting sector has a very high concentration of businesses (15.42). This industry sector also has a substantial number of businesses recorded (417).

The farming sector in South Bruce is also becoming more capital intensive. During the period from 2011 to 2021, farms capitalized with less than \$350,000 and between \$350,000 and \$999,999 decreased by 84% and 49% respectively, while those with over \$1 million in capital increased by 13%.


Figure 34: Total Farm Capital, Census of Agriculture, South Bruce, 2011-2021



### **Business Environment**

#### Municipal Finances

South Bruce is governed by a council consisting of a mayor and six councillors elected for a four-year term. The mayor and two councillors are elected at large, two councillors are elected from the Mildmay-Carrick ward and three councillors are elected from the Teeswater-Culross ward. An internal ballot is used to determine the Deputy Mayor position).

During the period of 2016 to 2021, municipal revenue and expenditures have steadily grown. By 2021 revenue had risen to \$13.43 million and expenditures to \$13.49 million. In 2021, revenues for the municipality substantially increased in comparison to the previous year, totalling \$2.3 million, most of these revenues came from net property taxation, user charges and fees, and donations and sale of goods<sup>22</sup>.




Figure 36: Revenues and Expenditures for South Bruce (2016-2021)

The property tax base of the Municipality has risen from \$5.47 million in 2011 to \$9.41 million in 2021; this represents a 72% growth<sup>23</sup>. The figure below shows property tax revenues for the Municipality. The tax base of South Bruce is mostly from the residential tax base and the farmland. The Municipality has only a small percentage of its total property taxation from commercial (5%) and industrial (3%) operations.



## **Health and Safety Facilities**

Municipal emergency response capabilities in the South Bruce include:

• MSB ERP: The Emergency Management and Civil Protection Act includes the requirement for hazard and risk assessment and emergency response planning. Section 2 of the Act requires that "in developing its emergency management program, every municipality shall identify and assess the various hazards and risks to public safety that could give rise to emergencies and identify the facilities and other elements of the infrastructure that are at risk of being affected by emergencies." Section 3 of the Act requires that "every municipality shall formulate an emergency plan governing the provision of necessary services during an emergency and the procedures under and the manner in which employees of the municipality and other persons will respond to the emergency and the council of the

municipality shall by by-law adopt the emergency plan." The MSB ERP includes the basic requirements of an ERP, and it appears that the risk assessment conducted has provided a basis for the ERP.

- Fire Rescue Service: The Municipality of South Bruce fire department operates two stations (Mildmay Carrick and Teeswater Culross) and has one permanent fire fighter and 50 volunteer firefighters (some of whom work at the Bruce Power fire department).
  - o Mildmay Carrick Fire Station: The Mildmay Carrick Station is led by a deputy fire chief and 25 volunteer firefighters. The Station provides a variety of fire rescue services to the community including:
    - Fire rescue services
    - Motor vehicle collision response
    - Medical first response
    - Code inspection and enforcement
    - Public education
    - Fire prevention
  - o Teeswater Culross Fire Station: The Teeswater Culross Station is led by a deputy fire chief and 25 volunteer firefighters. The station provides a variety of fire rescue services to the community including:
    - Fire rescue services
    - Motor vehicle collision response
    - Medical first response
    - Code inspection and enforcement
    - Public education
    - Fire prevention
- Mutual Aid Agreements: The MSB has established MAAs with other municipalities including:
  - o Township of North Huron
  - Municipality of Morris-Turnberry
  - o Township of Howick

#### **Municipal Infrastructure and Services**

The existing infrastructure and level of service provided varies across the Municipality. Water, wastewater and solid waste infrastructure is owned and operated by the Municipality of South Bruce, as is common across Ontario. Other infrastructure is owned and operated by private utilities including Hydro One (HONI), Westario Power Inc. (WPI), Enbridge, Wightman Telecom (WHM) and Rogers Communications Inc. (RCI). Within rural areas (and in the community of Formosa) some services are provided by private property owners (e.g. water wells and septic systems) or are unavailable (e.g. natural gas)<sup>25</sup>.

 Water: There are two drinking water systems (DWS) in South Bruce: Mildmay and Teeswater. Each DWS serves the local community via watermains which generally extend to all streets with residential or commercial properties within these settlement areas. All other properties in South Bruce use private wells to obtain water.

- Wastewater: Sanitary wastewater service is provided by the MSB in Mildmay, Teeswater and Formosa. Wastewater in Mildmay is collected by a gravity sewer system and then pumped to Mildmay Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP).
- O Stormwater/Drainage: Drainage in most areas of Mildmay, Teeswater and Formosa is provided by catch basins and storm sewers which outlet to local watercourses/rivers. Stormwater management quantity control (attenuation of peak flows) and/or quality control (removal of suspended solids) is only provided for areas which have been newly developed or redeveloped within approximately the past decade.
- o **Solid Waste:** South Bruce owns and operates two municipal landfills: the Mildmay-Carrick Landfill and the Teeswater-Culross Landfill.
- o **Electrical Power:** Residents and businesses in the Study Area are serviced by Hydro One or Westario Power depending on location.
- o **Natural Gas:** Following the acquisition of Union Gas in 2018, Enbridge holds the franchise for natural gas servicing in South Bruce. Enbridge natural gas infrastructure provides services in the settlement areas of Mildmay, Teeswater and Formosa.
- O Telecommunications: Wired telecommunications services in the Study Area are provided by Wightman Telecommunication and Rogers Communications. Wightman is a family-owned company with a 155-year history of servicing the South Bruce area. The region is relatively unique in Ontario, in being serviced by several smaller privately-owned firms such as Wightman, Bruce Telecom and Hurontel.

#### **Transportation**

There are no airports in South Bruce with scheduled air transportation services in or out the Municipality. The largest airports in proximity to the South Bruce include:

- Toronto-Pearson International Airport, Mississauga, ON (approximately 168 km)
- Region of Waterloo International Airport, Breslau, ON (approximately 110km)
- London International Airport, London, ON (approximately 139km)

Other local airports in the close proximity to South Bruce (without regular or scheduled flights) include:

- The Wingham Airport: is a registered aerodrome owned and operated by Papple Aviation. Situated on Highway 86, one mile east of Highway 4. It has a modern terminal facility, a 4,000' x 75' paved runway, and the beacon and runway lighting are operated by the ARCAL system (type K).
- Saugeen Municipal Airport: The Saugeen Municipal Airport (CYHS), is a Transport Canada registered airport located 2.5 km northwest of the town of Hanover. The airport serves as a base for flight training, sightseeing tours, air ambulance services, corporate jets, and recreational pilots. The 250-acre airport complex offers two paved runways with full instrument-approach systems, hangars for airport and private use, a main terminal that houses airport operations, The Airport Restaurant, rental spaces for partnering businesses and venues to hold public events and meetings.

#### **Economic Development**

In 2021, the Municipality of South Bruce developed an Economic Development Strategy Update<sup>26</sup> to help the community grow and to benefit all residents, businesses, and visitors. To promote a thriving future for South Bruce, the Municipality has outlined the following key opportunities:

- Stimulate Downtown revitalization (by leveraging Spruce the Bruce)
- Establish a farmers' market, culinary, and local food experience
- Leverage tractor culture to create unique place-based attraction
- Prepare and market the South Bruce Business Park
- Foster value-added agriculture and food processing
- Planned incremental residential development
- NWMO adaptive phased management project

Other organizations that support economy development in South Bruce include Bruce Community Futures, Saugeen Economic Development and Bruce County Economic Development and Tourism.

## Community Profile Summary



## Demographics

After experiencing population declines between 2001 to 2016, South Bruce has reversed the trend, partially influenced by the ability of people to work remotely, the housing market pressures in the Golden Horseshoe Region and attractiveness of the South Bruce location. In 2021, South Bruce had an estimated population of 6,254 people; an approximate 8% growth compared to 2016, and a 7% growth compared to 2011. The population in South Bruce is projected to maintain this growth over the few next decades. South Bruce's population is expected to grow 27% by 2036, and 40% by 2046. The population in South Bruce is rapidly ageing, similar to a majority of communities in Canada. The elderly population in South Bruce is projected to increase 152% by 2046. In addition South Bruce has, had a low share of immigrants. Immigrants are important for communities as they are a source for skilled and unskilled labour and could supplement the labour market as the replacement rate of workers continue to decline (natural births vs. deaths). With an ageing population, there is expected to be a decrease in the labour pool due to the increase in retirees. This will create job opportunities within the region and will require additional hiring in the region.



### **Employment and Labour Force**

South Bruce's labour force has grown by 237 between 2016 and 2020, or 7%. This growth rate is lower than Bruce County's and Ontario's. The labour force of South Bruce (people living in South Bruce regardless where they work) is primarily in agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting; manufacturing; and construction which is reflected in the employment and occupational composition of the municipality. The employment and occupational composition (people employed in South Bruce regardless where they live) in South Bruce suggest that the local economy has specialized in agriculture, with the top occupational subcategories being managers in agriculture (14% of occupations) and general farm workers (6% of occupations). Projecting out to 2028, employment in South Bruce is expected to remain near its current level and increase by 3% between 2022 and 2028. Employment in Bruce County and the Province of Ontario is expected to grow at 4% during the same time.



### **Business Environment**

Across South Bruce, there are 209 business establishments with employees and another 692 non-employer businesses with at least \$30,000 in annual sales, for a total of 901 businesses. Most of the businesses in South Bruce are small, with 61% of businesses with employees have fewer than five employees and 92% have less than 20 employees. The largest industry sectors by total number of businesses are agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting; real estate, rental, and construction. South Bruce also recorded a high concentration (location quotient) of agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting; mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction; and utilities relative to Ontario. The agricultural sector in South Bruce is led by farming, mostly in the oilseed and grain farming and cattle ranching and farming. Farms in these areas represented 73% of all farms in the Municipality.



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
